TOP THINGS TO DO

- **Peggy's Cove** — The most photographed lighthouse in Canada, on wave-battered granite boulders at a tiny fishing village ~45 min away.
- **Halifax Citadel** — The star-shaped hilltop fortress over downtown, with kilted soldiers, the noon gun, and sweeping harbor views.
- **Waterfront, Pier 21 & Titanic** — The Maritime Museum's Titanic gallery (many victims are buried here), Pier 21 immigration museum (Canada's Ellis...)
- **Lunenburg & South Shore** — A longer trip to UNESCO-listed Lunenburg, a perfectly preserved colorful colonial port town and home of the Bluenose...

BEST WALKS

- **Harbourwalk boardwalk** ~3 km · 1.5 hrs · easy — The lively waterfront boardwalk from Pier 21 past the Maritime Museum, the Historic Properties, tall ships, and seafood shacks — one...
- **Citadel & Old Town Clock** ~2 km · 1.5 hrs · moderate (uphill) — Up from the waterfront past the Old Town Clock to the star-shaped Citadel for the noon gun and panoramic harbor views, returning...
- **Public Gardens** ~1.5 km · 1 hr · easy — The exquisite Victorian-era Halifax Public Gardens — formal beds, fountains, and a bandstand — a serene green stop near downtown.

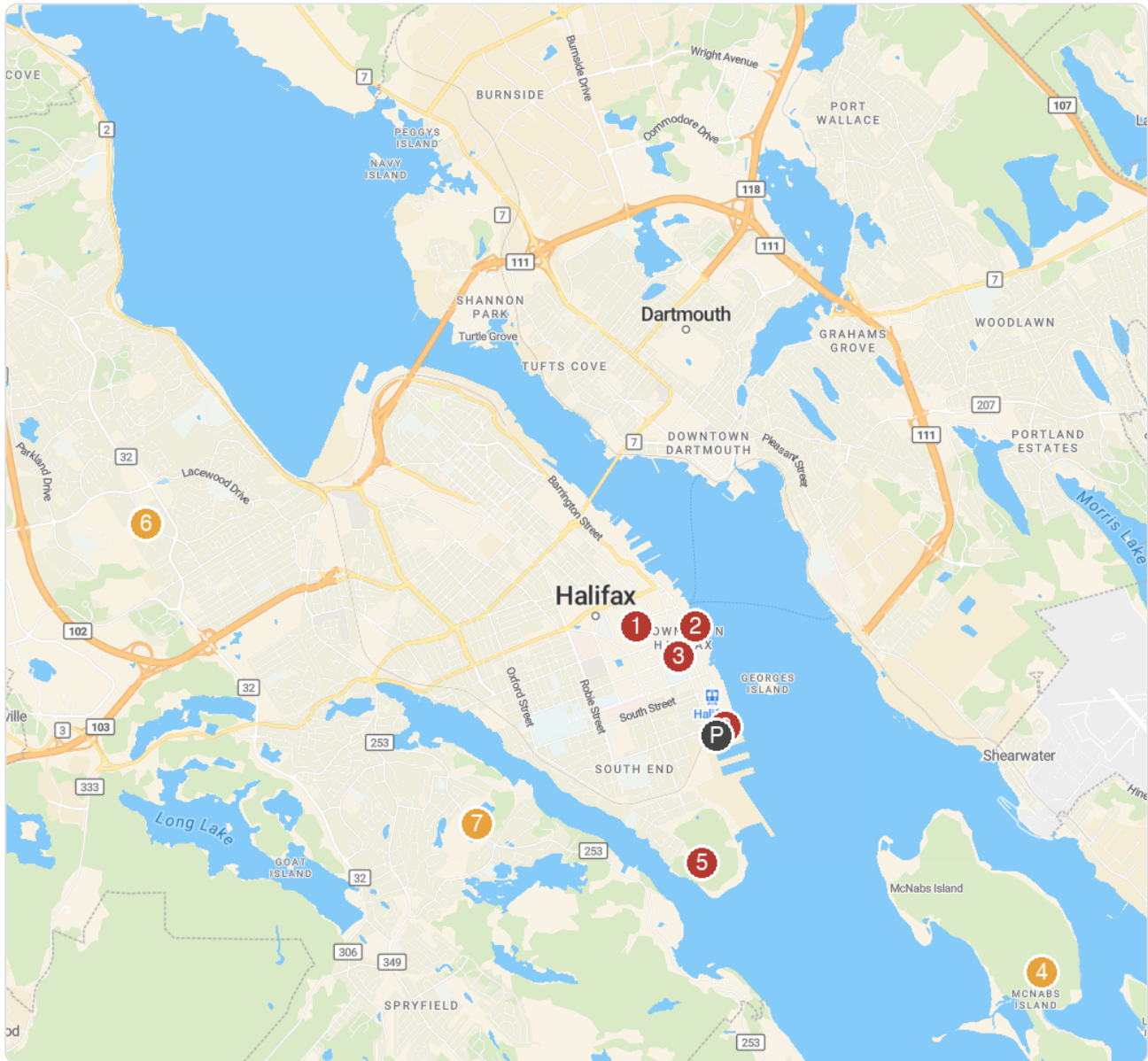
KNOW BEFORE YOU GO

- Eat a lobster roll. Halifax's waterfront seafood shacks serve fresh lobster rolls, fish & chips, and Nova Scotia scallops — peak Maritime eating.
- This is a walk-off gem. The boardwalk, museums, and Citadel are all on foot from the ship — save a tour only for Peggy's Cove.
- Halifax & the Titanic. The Maritime Museum's Titanic exhibit and the cemeteries where victims rest make a poignant, uniquely

1 **Halifax Citadel National Historic Site** Historic star-shaped fort with city views and re-enactments.

3 **Saint Mary's Cathedral Basilica** Historic Roman Catholic cathedral with stunning architecture and stained glass.

5 **Prince of Wales Tower National Historic Site** Canada's oldest martello tower, a historic circular defensive fort.

7 **Frog Pond Park** Scenic urban park with a pond, walking trails, and nature.

P **Cruise port / terminal**

2 **Maritime Museum of the Atlantic** Museum of Nova Scotia's maritime history, including Titanic artifacts.

4 **Fort McNab National Historic Site** Historic island fort, accessible by ferry, with coastal views.

6 **Mary Clayton Memorial Park** Small urban park with green space and memorial benches.

8 **Halifax Seaport Farmers' Market** Canada's oldest farmers' market, offering local food and crafts.
