TOP THINGS TO DO

- Inagua National Park Flamingo Tour** — The main event.
 - Morton Salt Pans** — One of North America's largest solar salt operations.
 - Birding Tour** — Beyond flamingos, Inagua hosts 140+ species including the Bahama Parrot, Roseate Spoonbill, and West Indian
- Whistling Duck.
 - Matthew Town & Great Inagua Lighthouse** — Stroll the quiet colonial streets, then visit the 1870 lighthouse — one of the last hand-operated, kerosene-fueled lighthouses in the Bahamas.
 - Farquharson's Beach** — A wild, undeveloped pink-sand beach with no facilities and absolute solitude.

BEST WALKS

- Government Dock to Great Inagua Lighthouse** ~0.8 miles each way | Flat | 15–20 min — An easy waterfront walk south from the tender dock to the 1870 lighthouse.
- Matthew Town Center Stroll** ~0.5 miles | Flat | 10–15 min — Wander the handful of streets that make up Matthew Town: weathered colonial buildings, a church or two, local bars serving conch and Kalik.

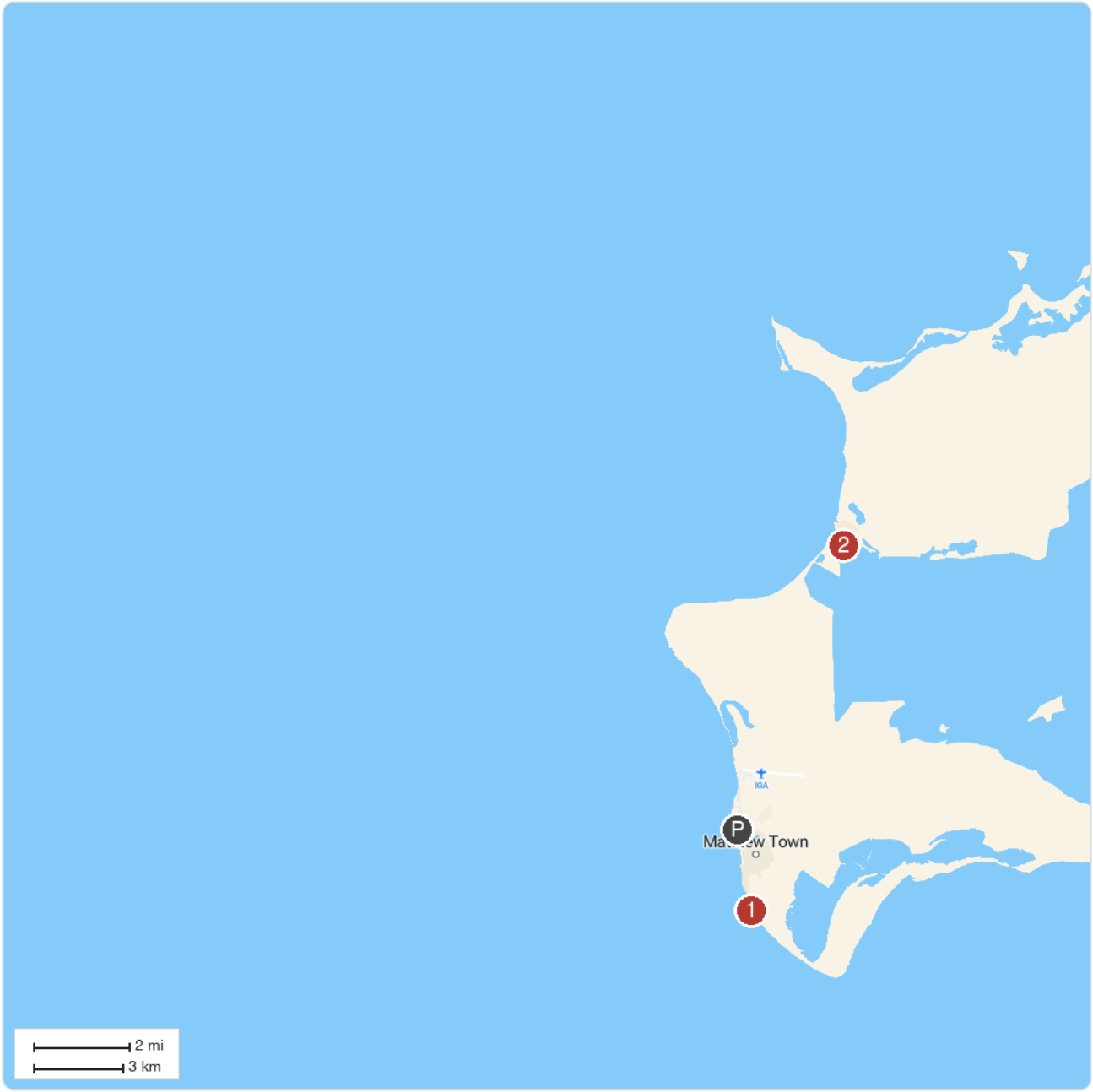
KNOW BEFORE YOU GO

- Bring serious bug repellent. Mosquitoes and no-see-ums are relentless near the salt ponds and wetlands. DEET or Picaridin, lightweight long pants and sleeves — not optional.
- Cash only. USD is accepted everywhere (1:1 with Bahamian Dollar). No ATMs accessible to cruise passengers; no credit cards at local restaurants. Bring small bills.
- Pre-book your national park guide. Inagua National Park requires a Bahamas National Trust guide. You cannot show up and wing it — arrange through your cruise line or the BNT well ahead of arrival.
- Salt-flat sun is brutal. Light reflecting off white salt is extreme. Polarized sunglasses, a wide-brimmed hat, and SPF 50+ sunscreen are essential for the salt pans and flamingo areas.
- No Wi-Fi, minimal cell signal. Treat this as a digital detox port. Download maps and park info before leaving the ship.
- Try fresh conch salad. Local spots like Cozy Corner and Toote's Bar serve conch dishes made with seafood pulled that day. This is as authentic as Bahamian food gets.
