GETTING ASHORE

Docking: Tender — ships anchor offshore; small boats ferry guests to the island jetty

Island size: Tiny — end-to-end stroll takes 10–15 minutes

TOP THINGS TO DO

- **Island Beach Day** — Claim a sun lounger on the powdery white sand, wade into the warm shallow lagoon, and watch baby blacktip reef sharks...
- **Coral Reef Snorkeling Boat Trip** — A short boat ride to the outer reef drop-off reveals sea turtles, eagle rays, and vibrant coral gardens.
- **Scuba Diving — Baa Atoll** — Certified divers can join guided drift dives on the outer reef, one of the Indian Ocean's premier dive sites.
- **Overwater Spa Treatment** — The resort's Cove Club spa offers massages and treatments in a serene overwater setting, with the warm lagoon all around.
- **Motorized Water Sports** — Jet skiing, parasailing, and seabob rentals are usually available through the resort's water sports centre for an extra...

BEST WALKS

- **Island Circuit & Sandbar Walk** 1 km · 20 min · Easy · Flat sand — Start at the resort jetty and loop the entire island on sandy paths and wooden boardwalks.

KNOW BEFORE YOU GO

- Book through the ship. You cannot access this private island without a pre-arranged excursion or day pass. Sort it before you sail — capacity is limited.
- Reef-safe sunscreen only. Chemical sunscreens are harmful to coral and strictly prohibited. Bring mineral (zinc-based) sunscreen or buy it on the island.
- The equatorial sun is brutal. Rash guards, hats, and sunglasses are not optional — UV levels here are extreme year-round.
